What is seminar anyway?

A fundamental human skill is to share information with others in a meaningful way. At its best a seminar is a safe place to practice this skill. Each class session individual students are designated to lead discussion—but all are expected to participate. Participation is difficult when someone is not familiar with the material at hand. People are remarkably attuned to knowing if what someone says means anything—a lack of substance is commonly referred to as BS. Thus, the guidelines for seminar as follows: *Each person is responsible for completing each day's assignment before seminar and contributing to the day's topic*. Do not to rely entirely on the person leading the discussion. Have something to say and participate in the give and take of the topic at hand.

Expected outcome

Upon completing the course, the student is expected to be fluent in oral presentation to a small group; to be able to abstract information from the respiratory therapy clinical research literature; and to be prepared to sit for the respiratory therapy board examinations.

Looking at the schedule, board reviews, review articles, and case studies are the format for the course. You are responsible for keeping track of your days to present. For each week's board review questions (entry level and advanced written tests) you will be given examination coding sheets and the assigned responses will be collected at the beginning of class. Students will be scored on each week's assignment and their results will be available the next session. Regarding the case studies, guidelines for presenting these are found under Course Information on the web site.
